

## purpose of an engagement framework

A strong framework serves as a roadmap to guide meaningful interactions between Council, residents and interest holders. It ensures that every voice is heard and valued, particularly those from equitydeserving groups.



## key elements

#### inclusivity

Engages diverse communities through accessible and varied methods, working to ensure everyone can participate.

#### transparency

Provides clear information about how decisions are made and how public input will be used.


#### consistency

Commits to a consistent approach to engagement, streamlining processes for both community and staff.



#### ongoing learning

Adapts and improves based on feedback and evolving community needs.






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## interest holder engagement themes

## Urban Indigenous engagement themes



#### barriers to engagement

Misunderstandings and misconceptions hinder dialogue



#### culturally appropriate

Desire for culturally appropriate practices like food, childcare and transportation



#### **Truth & Reconciliation**

Moving beyond symbolic gestures toward meaningful, sustained action



#### trust & collaboration

Relationship-building must be a long-term effort



#### capacity building

Cultural safety training for those who engage with equitydeserving communities



#### acknowledgements

Creating inclusive, heartfelt and reflective Territorial Acknowledgements

### survey engagement themes



inclusivity Hearing from everyone particularly those from equitydeserving groups—was important to participants



untapped potential

Two-thirds of Courtenay residents have not participated in formal engagement with the City



interest in online engagement

Many participants are interested in continuing with online surveys.



#### increased communication

Participants are eager to hear more about opportunities for engagement




#### transparency

Participants want to understand how their feedback was used in decision-making.



#### opportunities for all

Engaging youth, working families and those with limited time or mobility requires flexible engagement formats



## what to do about trust

Participants noted a lack of trust and perceived lack of influence on political decisions. Though not unique to Courtenay, it highlights the importance of taking steps to earn trust with community.

#### Raising awareness

The City could consider an awareness campaign about how decisions are made, and the role of engagement in this process.

#### Influence & IAP2

Clear communication is needed at the outset of projects to outline the level of input the City is seeking, and the level of influence community will have.

## framework overview

#### why we engage

Setting the stage for the importance of engagement & the commitment to creating a responsive & equitable engagement culture.

#### guiding principles

Pulling from engagement from community and staff, we define guiding principles for engagement at the City.

#### roles & responsibilities

Following the format of the communication strategy, we outline different sizes of projects, and how teams function on each.

### engagement planning

Outlining the planning process - including understanding who will be engaged, their level of influence, and potential community impact.

Outlining which tools and tactics are used for various project sizes-increasing consistency for community & staff.

#### equity considerations


Defining equity and how the City will continue to build more safe and inclusive spaces for folks to engage.
