CHANGES TO THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE COMOX VALLEY RECREATION GUIDE	Craig notified the group that there has been changes to the distribution of the Comox Valley Recreation guide. It is changing from "door to door" distribution to electronic access, "pick up" locations as well as printed copies upon request.	
Old Business Mcphee park update	Craig provided an update. The McPhee Meadows Nature Park Final Concept plan was adopted by Council on August 29, 2022. It is move to the detailed design stage and applications for grants are in progress.	
PARKS NAMING - LAWRENCE BURNS	Craig provided an update. The dedication event will take place on October 4, 2022 at 6 pm. RCCS Staff have sent invitations out for the event. Attendance is by invitation only due to the location of the event and Burns Family wishes.	
LEISURE FOR EVERYONE ACCESS PROGRAM (LEAP)	Craig did a short presentation on this extension to the pilot program which is starting in January 2023.	
AQUATIC SERVICES REVIEW (IN CONJUNCTION WITH CVRD)	Craig provided an update. The City is expecting to get some preferred options/recommendations for future community engagement on the future of aquatic services in Comox Valley.	
REGIONAL PARKS STUDY (WITH CVRD)	Craig provided an update. Provincial approval has now been received, and the CVRD will be bringing the 4 <sup>th</sup> and final reading of the service to the board on September 20, 2022.	
INITIATIVES FOR ENGAGING YOUTH WITH PRAC	The group discussed this topic as a whole. Allan suggested youth focus groups, and, Tom suggested that effort is made to engage young parents in the 30 years range and that schools could be engaged if there was a desired topic to focus on. Craig committed to reaching out to operations staff to see if there are topics or initiatives that recreation or culture could use engagement. Craig also reminded the group that there are youth engagement options through the LINC youth council and it may be beneficial if they were connected with the PRAC group. Craig noted that it would be a great fit and provide meaningful experience for the youth to take on community projects and report back to the group. Craig also mentioned that something similar could happen with adapted participants to help promote accessibility.	
Round Table Councillor Manno theos	Councillor Theos let the group know that during his election campaigning he heard many concerns including: RV campers having a lack of sani-flush in the	

heard many concerns including: RV campers having a lack of sani-flush in the City, the need for a dog park and Frisbee golf park, and needs from the Evergreen Community organization for new kitchen air conditioning, new stage, new stairs and that the city was not providing a response. Tom let the

	group know that he considers this a key conference facility that is well used and that it requires an investment to bring it back up to standards. Allan suggested that the City connect with the Evergreen to discuss opportunities to partner on renovations required.
BILL GREEN (VIA EMAIL PRIOR TO MEETING)	Bill (not available for meeting) submitted an email in advance of the meeting in regards to the baseball diamonds in Courtenay. The group discussed the different levels of playing fields to service the different levels of baseball in Comox Valley. It was suggested that there is a need for more baseball fields in Comox Valley. It was noted that there is currently a sports field study in place and that the group will wait to see the results. Tom was curious about participant numbers and Allan suggested tasking Bill with exploring the current numbers and trends in regards to baseball and to bring it back to the group. Bill also submitted a request for City plans for the area behind the Washington Inn. The item is not within the scope of the PRAC advisory commission and it was suggested that follow up could be made with the engineering department.
